

On Friday, November 9th, nineteen LA Harbor College Umoja students departed for the twoday Umoja XIV Conference held at the Riverside Convention Center. The Umoja Community Education Foundation hosts this annual statewide conference to expose participants to African rituals and customs, enhance understanding of the Umoja principles and practices, engage in critical cultural dialogue, and inspire student success through a variety of workshops and presentations. The conference kicked off with a keynote address from Dr. Eric Thomas (aka E.T. The Hip Hop Preacher) who spoke about the personal and educational challenges he overcame to ultimately rise to worldwide fame and success. The conference continued with various breakout workshops focused on topics ranging from student interaction with law enforcement to allied health careers. Following the workshops, students were given the opportunity to meet and speak with admissions representatives from University of California (UC) campuses and over 30 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Day one concluded with "EduTainment" (education + entertainment) activities such as African dancing, African beading, dialogue with the elders, and African drumming. The second day of the conference featured additional workshops and a closing keynote address from Dr. Joy DeGruy, acclaimed author of Post Traumatic Slave Syndrome - America's Legacy of Enduring Injury and Healing. "Umoja" is a Kiswahili word meaning unity. Kiswahili (also known as Swahili) has the largest number of speakers of all estimated 250 - 535 Narrow Bantu languages. These languages are spoken largely in regions commonly known as Central Africa, Southeastern Africa, and Southern Africa. "Habari Ya Umoja" means Unity News.

Umoja Program Eligibility

To be eligible for the Umoja Program a student must be:

- Interested in learning about the African Diaspora
- + Enrolled in 6+ units at LA Harbor College
- A student with a demonstrated need (first generation college student, economically disadvantaged, or socially disadvantaged)
- Motivated to earn one of the following: a Certificate of Achievement, an Associates Degree, and/or university transfer
